The Modern Slavery Act 2018 (Cth) requires certain businesses operating in Australia to report annually on the risks of modern slavery in their operations and supply chains, and the actions they are taking to address those risks. It defines modern slavery as practices such as slavery, servitude, forced labor, and human trafficking.

UN Guiding Principles

The UN Guiding Principles on **Business and Human Rights** provide a global standard for preventing and addressing the risk of adverse human rights impacts linked to business activity. They outline the state's duty to protect human rights, the corporate responsibility to respect human rights, and the need for access to remedy.

Alignment

The Modern Slavery Act aligns with the UN Guiding Principles by requiring businesses to conduct human rights due diligence, engage with stakeholders, and report on their efforts to address modern slavery risks in their operations and supply chains.

Understanding the Scope of Modern Slavery

1 Defining Modern Slavery

Modern slavery encompasses a range of exploitative practices, including slavery, servitude, forced labor, debt bondage, human trafficking, and child labor. It involves the coercion of individuals through the threat or use of violence. deception, or other forms of abuse.

2 Global Scale and Impact

Modern slavery is a widespread and persistent global issue, with an estimated 40 million victims worldwide. The impacts of modern slavery are devastating, including physical and psychological harm, restriction of freedom, and deprivation of basic human rights.

3 Vulnerable Populations

Developing a Modern Slavery Policy

Policy Commitment

Develop a clear and comprehensive policy that outlines your organization's commitment to addressing modern slavery risks. This policy should be endorsed by senior leadership and communicated throughout the organization.

Due Diligence Processes

Implement robust due diligence processes to identify, prevent, and mitigate modern slavery risks in your operations and supply chain. This may include supplier assessments, audits, and collaboration with workers and civil society organizations.

Grievance Mechanisms

Establish accessible grievance mechanisms that allow workers, suppliers, and other stakeholders to report suspected instances of modern slavery without fear of retaliation. Ensure that these mechanisms are effectively communicated and utilized.

Remediation Processes

Develop clear procedures for providing remedy to victims of modern slavery, should it be identified within your operations or supply chain. This includes collaborating with relevant authorities and supporting the rehabilitation and reintegration of affected individuals.

Communication

Clearly communicate your modern slavery policy and expectations to your suppliers. Ensure they understand their role in addressing modern slavery risks within their operations and sub-suppliers.

Capacity Building

Provide training and support to help your suppliers build their capacity to identify and address modern slavery risks. This may include resources, guidance, and collaborative initiatives.

Incentives and Consequences

Establish positive incentives, such as longer-term contracts or increased business, for suppliers who demonstrate a strong commitment to addressing modern slavery. Conversely, consider terminating relationships with suppliers who fail to comply with your policy and expectations.



Reporting and Transparency



Reporting

Comply with the reporting requirements under the Modern Slavery Act, providing transparent and detailed information on your efforts to identify and address modern slavery risks in your operations and supply chain.



Performance Metrics

Develop and track key performance indicators to measure the effectiveness of your modern slavery mitigation strategies. This will help you identify areas for improvement and demonstrate your progress over time.



Stakeholder Engagement

Engage with a wide range of stakeholders, including workers, civil society organizations, and government agencies, to gather feedback and input on your modern slavery reporting and performance.
